A BOND SCHEME. It is said there is a scheme on foot among a number of holders of Tennessee State bonds to get the government of the United States to assume the aggregate to \$14,000,000. Exactly who these schemers are or the precise line of action they propese to take to effect their purpose is not known at the present time, but will probably by developed in the future. It was on a grander scale and embraced the State indebtedness of all the Confederate States. The Earthquake in Cashmere. Calcutta Dispatch in London Times.

The latest returns regarding the damage occasioned by the earthquake in Cashmere on May 13th state the loss of life at 3,081 persons, besides 25,000 sheep and goats and 8,000 cattle. The number of dwellings ruined is computed to reach 75,000. A correspondent of the Calcutta English-
