In the midst of this scene Mahone pushed his way to the front of the stage. He called in the loudest tones for order, and when quiet was partially restored Mahone placed his hand upon Riddleberger and appealed to him to permit the convention to quietly proceed with the business.

Riddleberger appeared to be touched by this appeal, and extended his hand to Mahone. A reconciliation was effected amid a storm of the wildest cheering in all parts of the house.

The two Senators then retired to the back of the stage, when the two Senators embraced each other. Mahone kissed Riddleberger twice. The reconciliation, it is believed, prevented what was believed would have resulted in discord between the two Senators. Attorney General Blair joined the Senators and engaged in the hugging.
