ated the rank of general for him, and he was commissioned July 22, 1866. In 1867, when President Johnson suspended Stanton, Grant was made Secretary of War ad interim, and held the office until January 14, 1868. The Republicans unanimously nominated him their candidate for President, May 21, 1868, and he defeated Horatio Seymour, receiving 214 electoral votes to 80. He was re-elected in 1872, defeating Horace Greeley, and receiving a popular majority of 762,991. His electoral vote was 286 to 80 for the other candidates. After his retirement from the Presidency, General Grant spent some months of private life and then undertook his famous tour around the world. Everywhere he went tributes of admiration and respect were showered upon him, such as no crowned head of the world could have secured. He was the honored guest of royalty and of ancient and famous corporations. The freedom of England's chief cities was voted to him, and in China he was asked to settle great questions of domestic and foreign policy. On his return his friends made a great effort to bring about his nomination to a third term of the Presidency, but traditional opposition to a departure from the example set by Washington defeated the movement for his nomination. Since then his only connection with public affairs was in representing the United States in the negotiation of a treaty of commerce with Mexico. Establishing his home in New York, he embarked his means in the banking business carried on by his sons and Ferdinand Ward. The villainy of the latter wrecked the establishment, swept away his whole property, and hastened his death. His association with Ferdinand Ward seems to have been the unfortunate occurrence of his life, for after the failure of the firm, which attracted such wide attention and so much comment and criticism, from which General Grant did not escape, he seemed to be a changed and broken man. He was then, though the public was not advised of the fact, a victim of the disease which was slowly but surely eating his life away. He went out but little from his house, became depressed and felt that his fair name was disgraced. He grew worse until April 1st, last, when it was thought the crisis had been reached and the end was near. His death was even reported, but was shortly afterwards contradicted, and for several days the physicians, three of whom attended him, sent out hourly bulletins of his condition. But he rallied and seemed to gain strength, to continue the writing of his history and to take daily rides. His physicians fearing the effect of the summer heat in the city of New York, advised his removal to some more desirable place, and the tender of the cotage of Mr. Drexel, of Philadelphia, at Mt. McGregor, N. Y., on the foothills of the Adirondacks, was accepted, and to that place he was conveyed on the 16th of June. The journey, though but of several hours by rail, was a fatiguing one in his condition, but after a day's rest he rallied and seemed for some time to have been benefited by the change, until Tuesday night, when, succumbing to the disease and the extreme heat, his strength failed, and he quietly, in the midst of his attendants and family, waited the end, which came yesterday morning at eight minutes past eight o'clock.
