[GENERRAL GRANT CONTINUED] ated the rank of general for him, and was commissioned July 22, 1866. 1867, when President Johnson sus pended Stanton, Grant was made weretary of War ad interium, nd held the office until January 14, 868. The Republicans unanimously ominated him their candidate for regident, May 21, 1868, and he de-President Horatio Seymour, receiving 214 electorial votes to 80. He was reelected in 1872, defeating Horace Greely, and receiving a popular maority of 762,991. His electoral vote as 286 to 80 for the other caudidates. After his retirement from the Pres idency, General Grant spent some months in the unwonted restfulness

nation. Since then his only connection with public affairs was in representing the United States in the negotiation of a treaty of commerce with Mexico. Establishing his home in New York, he embarked his means in the banking business carried on by his sons and Ferdinand Ward. The villainy of the latter wrecked the establishment, swept away his whole property, and hastened his death.
His association with Ferdinand Ward seems to have been the unfortunate occurrence of his life, for after the failure of the firm, which attracted such wide attention and so much comment and criticism, from which General Grant did not escape, he seemed to be a changed and broken man. He was then, though the public was not advised of the fact, a

im of the disease which was slowbut surely eating his life away. He went out but little from his house, became depressed and felt that his fair name was disgraced. He grew worse until April 1st, last, when it was thought the crisis had been reached and the end was near. His death was even reported, but was shortly afterwards contradicted, and for several days the physicians, three who attended him, sent out hourly bulletins of his condition. But he rallied and seemed to gain strength, to continue the writing of his history and to take daily rides. His physi-cians fearing the effect of the summer heat in the city of New York, advised his removal to some more desirable place, and the tender of the cot tage of Mr. Drexel, of Philadelphia, at Mt. McGregor, N. Y., on the foothills of the Adirondacks, was accepted, and to that place he was conveyed on the 16th of June. The journey, though but of several hours by rail, was a fatiguing one in his condition. but after a day's rest he rallied and seemed for some time to have been benefitted by the change, until Tuesday night, when, succumbing to the disease and the extreme heat, his strength failed, and he quietly, in the midst of his attendants and family, waited the end, which came yesterday morning at eight minutes past eight o'clock.


