### Presidential Appointments—Mr. Cleveland's Official Utterances on New York Politics.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—The President today appointed Wm. Miller Postmaster at Carthage, Ga., Vice J. R. Winkle, resigned; Thomas J. Lina, at Greenfield, Tenn., the office having become vacant; Harrison W. Clark, at Jacksonville, Fla., vice Wm. Ledwith, suspended.

### Mahone's Bad Son.

Billy Mahone's son Butler has been in another scrape, but got off easy. The Baltimore Sun says, in the mayor's court at Petersburg, Va., Saturday, Butler, Mahone's son, and Senator Mahone, John Williamson and Charles Belcher were called to answer to the charge of using bad language on the streets Tuesday night, and overpowered Officer Edwards, who attempted to arrest them. In anticipation of the hearing the court room was crowded. The accused were represented by Hon. Charles F. Collier. Several witnesses were sworn. The first who testified was Officer Edwards, who stated that while on his beat on Lombard street last Tuesday night, about 11 o'clock, he heard the accused using bad language; that he said to them: "Gentlemen, you must stop using such language." Belcher asked: "Who is using language?" Edwards replied: "All three of you." Mahone then said to the officer: "If you say we are using bad language, you are a liar!" Officer Edwards then collapsed. Mahone and told him he would have to go to the station. Mahone said he would not go. Officer Edwards told him he would take him or die in the attempt. Belcher and Williamson then took hold of the officer, and Williamson took his stick from him. Belcher said to Williamson: "Don't turn him loose, for if he goes he will shoot!" Mahone then said: "Hold on to him! I will take him out of his pocket!" Edwards said Mahone did take his pistol and fired it at him, but missed his aim. The parties ran off, but were arrested shortly afterward. Mr. Collier, in addressing the court, said it was his deliberate judgment, both as a lawyer and a man, that the accused should be discharged. The mayor said he could send the accused on for indictment by the grand jury, but he would not do that, but would fine Mahone \$50, and Messrs. Belcher and Williamson \$25 each, and require each to give a bond of \$500 to keep the peace for six months. Mahone paid his fine and gave bond. Belcher and Williamson were fined \$25 each and gave bond.

### Mahone's Minister Cartridge.

A box containing one thousand musket cartridges has been found concealed in the house of Capt. Hamilton, the recent Republican collector of internal revenue at Danville, Va. Subsequently he was enabled to throw away this apparatus and exchange his crutches for a cane, and today, after eleven years of treatment, he is a healthy and vigorous young man, not only walking like other young men, but dancing, riding on horseback and playing tennis.
