CLOSE OF THE FAIR,

AND DISTRIBUTION OF THE PREMIUMS.

A List of Those Who Secured Awards--A Fine Day and Large Crowds on the Grounds--Charlotte's Best Fair at an End.

The fair closed yesterday, and there is but one expression of opinion in regard to it by those who visited the grounds, and that is, that this fair was decidedly a fine one in all respects and a much better fair than was generally expected. Yesterday's weather was faultless and large crowds visited the grounds to see the last of the fair, many going early and remaining all day. The awarding of the premiums was the signal for the general breaking up, but the grounds did not put on a lonesome look until sundown, by which time they were about deserted. The award of premiums was announced from Floral Hall by the secretary, Col. Chas. R. Jones, who had one of the largest and most highly pleased audiences that ever gathered for a similar occasion.
