STATE NEWS.

There were twenty-seven deaths in Wilmington during November.

Laurinburg Exchange: Captain Theodore F. Malloy made an assignment to Mr. D. D. McIntire, his principal salesman, last Monday morning. His estimated liabilities are \$21,000 and assets \$8,000.

News and Observer: At Company Shops on Monday, Sarah A. Hughes, of Raleigh, was ordained a preacher in the African M. E. church. Bishop H. M. Turner performed the ceremony of ordination. This woman is said to be the first female preacher ever ordained in that Conference. She preached here at the great colored camp-meeting in August, 1882, west of the city, and at that time attracted considerable attention.

State authorities are busily engaged sending out warrants on the State Treasurer to the pensioners under the new law. He has done a very thoughtful thing in sending to each pensioner a circular letter, as follows: "Enclosed I send you warrant No. —, for the sum of \$14 70 100, on the public Treasurer of the State, your pro rata share of the annual appropriation made by the General Assembly for the relief of Confederate soldiers, &c., under an act ratified the 11th of March, 1885. You must endorse this warrant by writing your name across the back of it, or in the event you cannot write your name, then by making your mark in the presence of a witness, and upon its presentation to the Treasurer he will pay it; or, it will be cashed, by any bank, merchant or county officer, without discount or 'shave.'"

Raleigh Visitor: At the regular meeting of the congregation of the first Baptist church, held last night, the resignation of Dr. Thos. E. Skinner, as pastor, was tendered and accepted. Dr. Skinner has for many years been connected and identified with the church, and doubtless there are many who will learn with deep regret of his resignation.

The Wilmington Review says that Rev. A. D. Cohen, a converted Jew who has been in the Christian ministry for nearly or quite thirty years, has become pastor of the Baptist church at Smithville, Brunswick county.

Lincleton Press: While the little boys of Mr. Pink Asbury, living near Denver, were chopping wood last Saturday the axe used by one of them glanced, and striking a little five year old brother in the face, cut his nose completely in two, only a strip of skin holding it. Dr. J. D. Mundy was called in and succeeded in replacing the nose and he thinks it will grow together again.

Wilson Mirror: President Bridgers, of the Atlantic Coast Line, was in town last week and rode through the country lying in the direction of Pitt county, from this point, with a view of ascertaining the feasibility of locating a branch road to some point in that county. Farmville, a flourishing village that lies east of Wilson about 20 miles, the centre of a rich agricultural community, has been suggested as an eastern terminus.

Washington Gazette: We are informed by Mr. Henry Cutler, from Bath, of a very sad death which resulted from burning on last Friday. It appears that the daughter of Mr. S. B. Sawyer, aged 14 years, was in the dining room preparing dinner for her father, whom she was expecting home at the usual time. Before she was aware her clothing caught fire and in a moment she was enveloped in flames. Her little brother ran to a neighbor's house for assistance and the burning daughter ran to meet her father, who was a quarter of a mile from home. When the screaming child reached her father all her clothes were burning off and her flesh was burned in a most horrid manner. She was taken home, and after suffering the most excruciating pain, died on Sunday morning last.

Hickory Press: The break at the tobacco warehouses last Thursday were the largest ever known in Hickory. Both warehouse were crowded, there being about 300 piles of tobacco on the floors. There were farmers here from almost all the surrounding counties with tobacco, and so far as we were able to learn they were very well pleased with prices realized. The leaf was generally of an inferior quality, and did not bring such prices as it did last season; however, much of it sold at from \$20 to \$30 per hundred pounds.

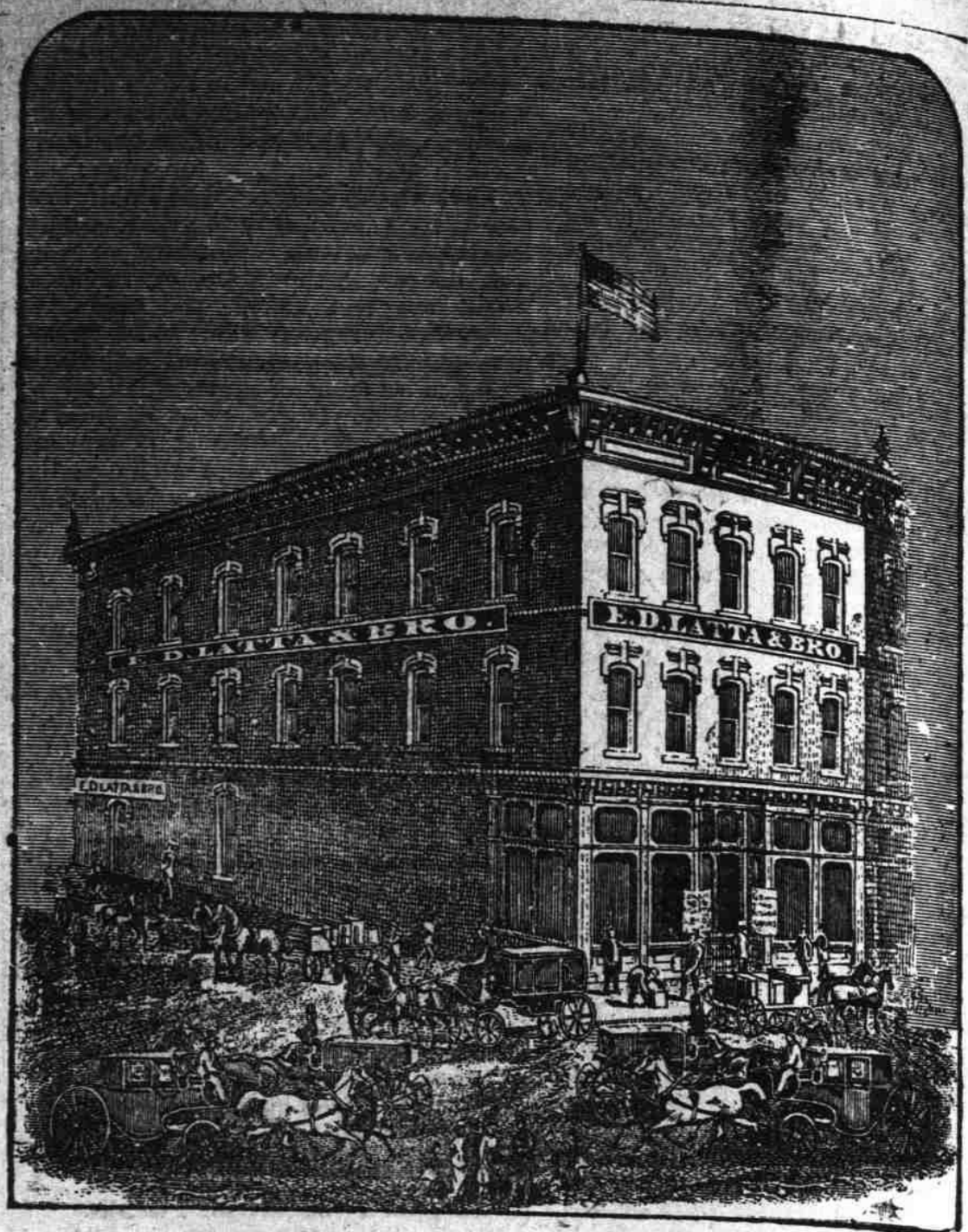
