

FLOODED BAILBOADS.

Trouble from the Rains Reported in all Directions-The Air Line Washed Out-A Break in the Carolina Central-Damage to the Western North Carolina.

As one r sult of the heavy rainstorm of Tuesday night, the passenger train from Atlanta, due here yesterday afternoon at 6:20 o'clock, did not arrive in Charlo te until 12 o'clock last night. This delay was caused by a serious washout in the Air Line track, at some point in Georgia. The Charlotte bound passenger train was caught on the Atlanta side of the break, and the Atlanta bound passenger train was caught on the Charlotte side. The break occurred at a culvert yesterday forenoon, and, as in the case of the ground, and the swollen stream, the work of 'repairing the break was a very difficult and tedious one The division wrecking train, with a full crew of hands, arrived at the scene within an hour after the washout occurred, and the hands were at once set to work repairing the dam

Mr. Austin, lineman for the Western Union telegraph Company, gathered up his tools yesterday af ternoon for a business trip up the Western North Carolina road, where heavy damage to both the railroad and telegraph property is reported. The telegraph lines are almost anni hilated between Asheville and Warm Springs, and on the Ducktown branch of the railroad some damage to the track by washouts, has occur red. Information in regard to the situation on the Western North Carolina road is hard to obtain, on account of the wrecked telegraph lines, but it is learned that the track between Salisbury and Asheville is in good

points beyond Asheville A washout on the Carolina Cen tral, at a point between Charlotte and Rockingham, is said to have occurred yesterday, but nothing very definite in regard to its extent could be learned. The Carlotte train for Wilmington left on schedule, time, and it is inferred from this that it was expected to have the break clear-

ed for the passage of that train. The Richmond and Danville men report tremendous rains between arlotte and Richmond, but up to last night no damage had 'been sustained by that road, though at some places the road appeared to pass through great lakes of muddy water The Yadkin river was on a rapid rise yesterday afternoon and all the smaller streams were overflowing the low lands.

Lincoln Court. The celebrated injunction suit of the Carolina Central Railcoad Company, against the Boston and Southern Cons ruction Company, is still "hauging fire" in the Superior court at Lincolnton, and it may be several days yet before it is disposed of. The case was argued from 5 o'clock Tues day afternoon to 10 o'clock that night, and was then adjourned to 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, at which time it was to have been again called

Yesterday morning the court took up the regular docket, leaving the railroad case temporarily on the cooler. The Massey mill case was continued by the State, though the defendant urged an immediate trial. There were about one hundred witnesses in the case, and as Lincoln has only one week's term of court. the probabilities were that should the Massey case have been taken up, it would have occupied the entire week. Four State prisoners were in the jail at Lincolnton awaiting trial, and it was decided to give attention to the jail cases, in preference to the single Massey case. All the Charlotte witnesses came home last evening.

How the Tramps are Moving. The grand army of tramps is now on the return trip, and detachments pass through Charlotte every day for the North. The tramps move in squads of from en to twenty members, and it is seldom that they are seen in less numbers than ten. For the past two weeks gangs of the fraternity have arrived daily at the passenger depot here, generally spending the night in and under the box cars, watching for a change to steal a ride out on the first freight train. The North bound freights are literally infested with tramps, and so desperate and determined are the majority of them, that the brakemen have almost ceased to "bother" them, preferring to let them ride than to run the risks of a big fight. The only reason given for the return North of the tramps is that the weather up there is now beginning to turn warm. These tramps are generally impudent, desperate fellows, and our people should be warned against permitting them to enter their premises on any pretext.
