Mr. Kirke claims that this lamp gives a light fully equal to gas, has no chimneys, does not smoke, and cost of maintaining is about the same as our smoky oil lamps, which gives such poor satisfaction. Atlanta has used these lamps in her suburbs for five years, also many other cities in the north and west, where the gas mains do not extend.

LOCAL RIFLES.

—Look out for April delusions today.

—Snow was falling in the western section of the State yesterday afternoon.

—There was no organization of the Knights of Labor last night. At the meeting at the Mayor's court room seven trades were represented, and one representative from each trade was appointed as a committee to provide for a public meeting to-night at the court-house if it can be procured, at which time and place an organization will be perfected. There was a large meeting last night and much interest was manifested. One of the Messrs. Newcomb presided.

Storm and Calm.
At one o'clock yesterday morning, a very heavy rain commenced falling and continued at intervals until after daylight. Lincoln Court.

The celebrated injunction suit of the Carolina Central Railroad Company, against the Boston and Southern Cons traction Company, is still "hanging fire" in the Superior court at Lincoln, and it may be several days yet before it is disposed of. The case was argued from 5 o'clock Tuesday afternoon to 10 o'clock that night, and was then adjourned to 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, at which time it was to have been again called up.

Yesterday morning the court took up the regular docket, leaving the railroad case temporarily on the cooler. The Massey mill case was continued by the State, though the defendant urged an immediate trial. There were about one hundred witnesses in the case, and as Lincoln has only one week's term of court, the probabilities were that should the Massey case have been taken up, it would have occupied the entire week. Four State prisoners were in the jail at Lincoln awaiting trial, and it was decided to give attention to the jail cases, in preference to the single Massey case. All the Charlotte witnesses came home last evening.
