

Business Men to Make Application for a Charter-Graded School.

A petition for a charter-graded school for the city of Fayetteville, N. C., was filed in the office of the Register and Deeds yesterday afternoon. The petition was signed by a number of business men of the town and is in compliance with the provisions of the act of the General Assembly of 1907, which authorized the establishment of a charter-graded school in any town having a population of more than 500 persons.

CLAYTON SCHOOLS OPEN.
Two Veteran Teachers Employed by the Board of Education—Personal and News Notes.

Clayton, Sept. 9.—The public schools opened here last week with about 200 in attendance and promises of the most successful year yet. There were fears that it would not be so successful as last year, but the fact that Prof. R. F. Williams has been principal of the schools for two years and he and the board had some trouble the week before the school opened to begin and to enter his new employment. Prof. D. L. Ellis and Prof. J. R. Williams, two veteran teachers and started the school on time with Miss Mattie Guiley and Louie Shore in the primary and intermediate departments, and Miss Lester as music teacher. It will be remembered that Prof. R. F. Williams is the man who had the tilt with Mr. Scarborough at the A. and M. Summer School a short time ago in regard to the prejudice of the Confederate soldier. The schools here are kept up by the profits of the dispensary.
A number of our people have attended the World's Fair, among them Mr. and Mrs. Herman Horn, who has returned from the fair with a number of papers which would best serve the material and industrial interests of this city and section.
Yesterday Mr. Gaster, of this city, a leading Odd Fellow of the State, attended a gathering of members of the order at Sanford, and late in the afternoon started home in the caboose of a freight train. A sudden stoppage of the train threw him from his seat, another passenger falling on him, and Mr. Gaster sustained a fracture of the arm, with painful sprain of the wrist and thumb.
Mr. F. R. Rose, secretary of the chamber of commerce, shows that over 5000 bales of cotton are being produced by the factories of Fayetteville and tributary section annually, which approximate \$750,000 for raw material alone. This is distributed among the following mills: Lakeview, Holt-Williams, Holt-Morgan, Holt-Holt, Holt-Cumland, Holt-Mills Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, without counting the two Ashley, Bailey-Mills and the big Coleman factory, the erection of which is soon to begin. Nor does it include the foundries, iron and wood works, copper shell works, merchant flour and corn mills, etc. Most of these factories will call for all the 4000-horsepower to be brought here by the Cape Fear Electric Power Company about November 1st. Mr. John R. London, of the factory Cotton Company, estimates that the cost of operating a factory by electricity is less by more than 50 cents than by steam in the following figures: Steam, 1000 months, \$41,000 per year, \$11,540 electricity, per month, \$481.00 per year, \$5,762.

DAUGHTER OF REV. W. S. ROSE PASSES AWAY IN TEXAS—Death of a Child—Hon. B. H. Bunn Critically Ill.

Rocky Mount, Sept. 9.—The sad intelligence has just been received here of the death of Miss Mary Rose, which occurred this afternoon at 2 o'clock at El Paso, Texas, where she went some time ago in search of health. Miss Rose was a beloved daughter of Rev. W. S. Rose, pastor of the Methodist church, here, and her many friends in Rocky Mount and other towns will learn with deep regret of her untimely taking away. At this writing it has not been ascertained as to where her remains will be taken for burial, but it is supposed that they will be taken to Charlotte, the former home of the family.
Rev. J. D. Bundy, the presiding elder of this district and who lives in Rocky Mount lost his little 4-year-old daughter Monday. The little girl died from an attack of meningitis.
Hon. B. H. Bunn, who is sick at Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, is still in a critical condition. However, his physicians entertain some hope of his recovery.
