Hoffman and Horace Hoffman, sons of ex-Representative Julius H. Hoffman of this county, leave to-day for the Pasteur Institute, in Baltimore, to be treated for what they fear was the bite of a rabid dog.

When the dog returned home, they found it had disappeared. Only to-day they learned that the dog, after showing every symptom of hydrophobia, had died four days after leaving home, near Glen Alpine station, about 12 miles from the Hoffman home.

The board of commissioners of Morganton has decided to have a survey for a sewerage system made at once. When the contract is awarded, it will be determined under what plan the funds shall be raised to install it.
