

Feeling Against Foreigners Said to be Growing Worse Instead of Better. Washington Special, 17, to New York

Sun. Recent advices which have come to the State Department do not indicate that the situation as regards the national feeling which exists toward fortional feeling which exists foward for-elgners in China is at all improved. On the contrary, the conditions ap-pear to be growing even worse, and officials here are all the more con-vinced of the wisdom of sending more troops to the Philippines, who may be thrown into China in the event of trouble. Two regiments of infantry and two batteries of field artillery will leave the United States for the Philip-pines on February 1. This will give this government a large force to use

pines on February I. This will give this government a large force to use in China in case there is an outbreak against foreigners. Acting under instructions from the State Department the various Ameri-can consuls and agents throughout China have made mail reports to the Department concerning the internal conditions in China. These malk re-ports have arrived in numbers recently and nearly all of them indicate that the conditions are not growing better. They come from various parts of Chi-na and admirably reflect the exact status of conditions there. There has been, however, no recent cable des-patches which would indicate that trouble is close at hand.
