COTTON UP 1 TO 10 POINTS  
Census Report on Cotton Unfinished  
Was Chief Feature of a Very Active and Uncertified Market—Strong Advance Followed Report, but Was Lost in Large Part Through Bearish Arguments.

New York, Feb. 2.—The cotton market was very active and uncertain yesterday, the amount of cotton ginned on Jan. 29 at 20,000 bales, the chief feature of the day's fluctuations, were very irregular and at times quite erratic, while, but closing prices were 1 to 10 points net higher. Sales were estimated at 100,000 bales.

The market opened firm at an advance of 10 to 12 points in response to higher cables than expected and a continuation of the government report which was in the wire office at 11 A.M. for March, when the report was received from Washington that the Census Bureau would issue an estimate of crop beginning Feb. 10, but the market almost immediately turned weaker under a renewal of speculation and bearish pressure. The original report was 100,000 bales, but when it was checked March 10, it was off 5 points net lower, and rumors were circulated on the floor of the Commodity Exchange that the figures had been expected yesterday. When the report was published, however, it proved that the figures were 100,000 bales, all located for sale, and the market quickly advanced to 110 for March, or about 25 to 30 points above the low point of the morning. There were many and various arguments to discredit the accuracy of the report, long cotton came out on the advance, and fluctuations during the late trading hours followed.

Receipts at the ports to-day, 18,700 bales, against 23,428 last week and 21,000 last month; 10,000 bales last week and 10,000 last year. To-day's receipt at New Orleans, 2,700 bales, against 7,300 last week and at Houston, 7,200 bales, against 10,000 last year.

## STOCK MARKET LESS ACTIVE.

Uncertain Tone Was a Fair Indication That Operations of Bear Party Had Been Pretty Well Completed—Bank Statement Outlook Had Pressing Effect.

New York, Feb. 2.—The feverish activity and violent movements in a few stocks to-day tended rather to obscure the direction of general movement in the market as a whole. The forced liquidation in the early part of the week offered attractive opportunities to the eager bearists, who had stored up their desire with great freedom. Their necessary buying operations to cover were a strong factor in the rally and the uncertain tone of the market was reflected in the fact that these operations had been pretty well completed. Such speculative interest as there was to-day concerned itself more with the market than with the individual stocks, in all stages from the vague rumors to defined and detailed statements of alleged terms, some sort of combination amongst the stock companies being commonly accepted as an accomplished fact. There was a wealth of detail of assistance also regarding the terms of the proposed distribution of the iron lands owned by the Great Northern Railway Company.

Investigation reveals that a deal with the United States Steel Corporation for this purpose is involved, and although the president of the Great Northern is publicly reported as dallying with the idea of a merger, the Northern has a natural effect on Union Pacific, owing to the large holdings of that stock which accrue to the Union Pacific from the Great Northern securities settlement. The Southern Iron group also made a vivid response to revised margin requirements. The character of the new margin statement to be issued with some distrust and other stocks were sold. Rending was affected by a settlement of the coal miners dispute between the coal miners and operators. The bank statement outlook probably had some bearing on the general market.

The tone of the gold money market held quite firm, but this was supposed to be due to the passing effect of the first of the month remittance of the annual bullion money from Europe to America.

Funds were irregular. Total sales, 14,000; purchases, 12,000; United States 12,000.

New York, Feb. 2.—Spot cotton was firmer. Buyers and sellers apart, factors had been slow in arriving. Delivered on contracts 200. Quotations revised, good ordinary and low middling advanced 10 to 15 points, ungraded 10 to 12 points.

At present the future market was up 7 points, but before the reading of the government report it sagged down 10 to 12 points. After the reading of the report, March advanced from 11 to 11.50, which was 5 points below yesterday's closing. May was 2 to 3 points above 11. Later in the session there was an improvement of a few points. The market closed firm with net gains of 1 to 3 points.
