A HOTEL FOR TRAVELING MEN. Capital Being Subscribed for Such an Enterprise—A Description of the Contemplated Plans—Structure to Cost \$100,000.

It is not improbable that a new hotel will be erected on the Fox property which was purchased from Dr. E. C. Register, by Messrs. Julia H. Little, C. E. Bryant and O. D. Wheeler several days ago. The new hotel will be operated on the European plan and will be devoted especially to the traveling men. Those who are backing the new enterprise believe that such a hotel will be a financial success. Charlotte is the center of the Carolina territory, and is the natural point where all of the men traveling in this section should spend Sunday. It is believed that the erecting of such an establishment catering especially to the tastes of the traveling public, will draw many well known drummers to this city who heretofore have been spending their time elsewhere. Effort is being made to place as much of the stock as possible among the traveling men themselves. The shares have a par value of \$100 each and it is hoped that 300 traveling men may be induced to take at least one share. A number quite a number have been disposed of and others are being taken as fast as the scheme may be explained. One well known citizen stated to an Observer reporter yesterday that he had already placed 20 shares.

The proposed new hotel will cost \$100,000. It is to be five stories in height and is to contain approximately 75 rooms. All modern conveniences will be provided and 20 of the rooms will have private baths. A restaurant conducted on the European plan will be on the top of an electric elevator will be installed and a number of large sample rooms are to be provided for the accommodation of the traveling men. The plans call for store rooms on the ground floor. The bed rooms will command from 75 cents to \$1.50 per day. It is believed that a hotel, conveniently located equidistant between the city and station, of modern construction and up-to-date service, having the active support of the traveling men will be a first class investment. The stock is now being secured and it is all the plans materialize, the construction of the new hotel will begin this summer.
