Acting Grand Master Smith conduct ed the Masonic features of the programme assisted by the members of the order. The orator of the day was President

Henry N. Snyder, of Wofford College, who chose for his subject a very happy and appropriate theme-"Washing-ion, the Man Who Laid the Cornerne of the Republic.

His speech rang with patriotism from beginning to end and that his rds found an echo in the hearts and ninds of his auditors was manifested by the close attention on the part of the vast assemblage which filled every availible foot for several hundred feet pround the stand. The children of the city schools, prior to the opening of the ceremonies of the day, dressed in stumes depicting the various wellknown characters of Mother Goose's rhymes, formed in line and, headed by that patron saint of the nursery and mounted on roller skates, swiftly glided through the principal streets of the city and finally brought up at the

The day is reckoned as an eventful one of the history of the city, as it marked the presentation of the first Federal structure to the community. It was through the work of Representative Johnson that the building was made possible and the due public credit was given him by one of the speakers.
