### MANY SALARIES RAISED SALISBURY OFFICERS NAMED.

W. B. ORR ELECTED POLICEMAN.

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Assistant Chief of Police Eleceted — Sun of Late Mr. J. L. Orr Named to Succeed Mr. B. J. Summerrow on the Police Force—Annual Re-ports of the Several Departments Read—Col. A. L. Smith Recom-mends Two Sub-Stations of the Fire Department be Established— Other Insus of Interest. Fire Department be Es

No assistant chief of police, to suc ed the late Mr. J. L. Orr, was elected by the fire, police and health comon last night, action being deterred to some subsequent session. Mr. Walter B. Orr, a son of the late tant chief, was made a member of the regular police force in lien of Mr. B. J. Summorrow, resigned. The salary of the chief of police was increased \$200 a year, the pay of the two police sergeants as well it that of the assistant chief of the fie department, was raised \$5 per month The salaries of the members of the fire station No. 2 were made the sam as those of station No. 1. Annual reports were submitted by the chairman covering the operations of the several departments during the fiscal

year, closing April 30. Mayor S. S. McNinch presided over the meeting last night and all the members were present... namely, Messrs. J. A. Durham, J. L. Blakely, J. K. Wolfe, Col. A. L. Smith, J. H Wearn and J. J. Williams.

Immediatly after the meeting was called to order, the question of the election of a successor to the last as sistant chief of police was taken up. It was thought at first that this mat-ter would be disposed of but, after some little discussion, action was post-

The resignation of Mr. B. J. Summerrow was read and the names of several applicants for the vacancy were submitted. On motion of Mr. Durham, seconded by Col nith, Mr. Walter B. Orr was elected a regular officer to succeed Mr. Summerrow, the vote being unani-

Mr. Durham then read the report of the police department for the month of April, which he followed with a report covering the operations of the department during the In April, 186 arrests year. In April, 186 arrests were made, and \$402.80 was collected in fines. costs, etc. During the year, the police department made 2.041 arrests, 564 of which were for State cases and 1,477 were city cases. In the recorder's court, the amount of fines during the year amounted to the costs amounted to \$2,-905.45; \$300 was collected from the Southern Railway Company and \$180 the Seaboard Air Line Company, making a grand total of \$5,-042.25.

Mr. Durham suggested that favorable action be taken by the commission on the recommendation of Chief H. C. Irwin that the department be furnished with a horse for a mounted policeman. This suggestion was carried out, and the department was authorized to make the necessary purchase. Mr. Durham alommeded that the salary of the two police sergeants be increased per month and that the salary of the chief of of police be raised \$200. Both recommendations were voted upon favorably.

Mr. Blakely, chairman of the health department, submitted a verbal report of the work accomplished by the sanitary board during the past year. He stated, at the outset, that the depari-ment had spent approximately \$3,500 more than had been allotted to it. cited several items showing how this deficit had been caused. For instance, the crematory had been repaired at heavy cost, bills had held over from the last administrations which had to be paid out of this board's money, and many other smaller expense accounts, which did not exactly belong to the other departwere paid out of the funds ments, of this board. Mr. Blakely stated that four men were necessary on the sanitary force during the cummer. He recommend-ed that Mr. N. A. Barnhardt, superintendent of the crematory, be instruct-ed to act as sanitary policeman in ward 4, his pay being raised to that of a regular sanitary officer. This recommendation was adopted. On motion, Mr. J. F. Owens was elected an extra officer for service during the summer months. Mr. Blakely stated that he would ask the board of aldermen to pur-chase two extra mules and wagons for use by the health department. He stated also that he intended to re-quest that a tax be put upon all sur-face closets in the city which were not connected with the city sewer system. Another matter that he proposed to have looked after was the presence of hog pens in certain thick-ly settled sections. Mr. Blakely clos-ed his remarks with the statement that he would ask that the appropriation to the health department be increased to \$15,000 a year. Col. A. L. Smith's report showed the fire department to be in fine shape. During the year, the depart-ment had been called upon to extinguish 58 fires in the city, 5 in Dilworth and 2 beyond the city lim-The total damage amounted to \$21,275. To quote from Col. Smith's report: "I most respectfully recommend that the appropriation be increased in proportion to the growing needs of the department. I would suggest that the matter of a permanent sta-tion No. 2 be taken under advisement, as we are now renting two small stores which are inadequate for the purpose. I recommend that as soon as practicable two sub-stations be established, and later a third one, as I have found the runs now to the outer sections of the city are too long bit of the efficient work, our present ap-paratus being too heavy for such. "The chief has shown himself a very efficient officer and has his deapriment in excellent shape, owing to his fine judgment and executive ability. I desire to thank him and his men for their faithful service durfng the past year and congratulate him on the condition of the depart-ment." In conclusion, Col. Smith recom-mended that the salary of the assist-ant chief be raised 15 per month and that the members of department No. receive the same pay as the memthese suggestions were embodied in the form of motions, which were adopted. Mr. J. K. Wolfe, of the finance committee, reported that the police department had spent \$17,823.61 dur-ing the past year: the fire depart-ment \$17,198.76, and the health de-partment \$18,547.81. The incidental expenses of the commission had amounted to \$255.45. The meeting then adjourned.


