THE DEATH RECORD. Rev. J. W. O'Brien, of Richmond. Correspondence of The Observer. "Hamil, Rev. James W. O'Brien, one of the oldest and best loved ministers of Richmond county, died at the county home Tuesday night. The funeral was held from the county home Wednesday, interest being at Great Lake church. He was at one time very prominent in the church and county affairs. He was for two or three years president of the conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, but later joined the Methodist Episcopal Church and continued as a local preacher the remainder of his life. He was once jailer of Richmond county and later superintendent of the county home where he died. He was a strong preacher and his pastorates were attended by success.
