North America 681,060,000,000 Great Britain and Ireland 193,000,000,000 Russia 40,000,000 Belgium 23,000,000,000

FOREIGN NEWS NOTES, Canada Reduces Duty of Otis Fifty For Cent.—Hallway Building at Clenfuegos. Bulletin, Bureau of Manufactures.

The revenues of Canada for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1996, are estimated at \$79,000,000 by Finance Minister Fielding, according to a report received from Consul General John C. Foster; by the bureau of manufacturers. The imports of Canada during the ten months to May 1 are stated to have been over \$230,000,000, an increase of more than 000,000, an increase of more than \$20,000,000 over the same period of 1905. The Canadian government has reduced the duty from five cents to two and one-half cents per gallon on refined, lubricating and other oils produced from petroleum. The Ca-nadian oil wells are running dry, and large quantities of American oils are now shipped in, reports Consul H. J. Harvey, of Fort Erie. The amigra-tion into Canada during the ten months of the present fiscal year has amounted to 117,585, as compared with 99,309 for the same period of 1905. The greatest increase was from the United States, which furnished 43,337 Canadian settlers, or 11,268

more than last year.

Consul Max Bachr reports from Clenfuegos that the splendid new iron pier of the Cuban Central Railway, and the proposed construction of one by the United Railways of Habana, the material of which is already on the ground, and of another for the use of Sir William Van Horne's new railway, coupled with substantial improvements of the old docks, have cleared Clenfueges of the unenviable reputation of the most expensive port in Cuba, and it will henceforth be known by the fine advantages offered to ships and ex-porters. Besides this, the dredging of the harbor has been ordered by the governmnt, and there is already available for this about \$200,000.
