THIS DAY IN HISTORY

1811 - Henry Hudson, having wintered in the bay which bears his name and preparing the object of his voyage, a northwest passage, a conspiracy broke out on this day among the ship's crew, when Hudson, his son and five others, most of whom were sick and lame, were forced into the shallop, with a small quantity of meal, one gun and ammunition.

1831 - John Smith, one of the early settlers of Virginia, died. He was a brave and daring man, and it was mainly owing to him that the colony was made permanent.

1789 - Fort George erected at the head of Lake George.

1770 - Fete on account of the marriage of Louis XVI, of France, when 15,000 people were trampled to death.

1782 - About 300 American troops, with fixed bayonets, surrounded the house in which Congress was sitting and demanded a redress of grievance.

1783 - The Hampshire adopted the Federal constitution, recommending amendments, being the ninth State to do so; votes 57 to 46.

1791 - A flood near Havana swept away 8,000 persons.

1804 - It was reported that the position of high admiral of France would be reserved for Jerome Bonaparte and his American marriage cancelled, as it had not been approved by his brother, the Emperor.

1853 - A boat crew from the brig-of-war Huzzar, lying in the harbor of Smyrna, seized in that port a Hungarian refugee named Koszta, and carried him to the ship. The populace, excited by the outrage, attacked three Austrian officers, of whom two were killed. Koszta, having protection in virtue of his primary declaration of an intention of becoming an American citizen, Capl. Ingraham, of the American frigate-of-war St. Louis, demanded his release. The affair caused a good deal of excitement throughout the civilized world.

1857 - The "Old Watch," which had existed in Boston since 1831, was abolished and a police department established.

1862 - Gen. Meade's army removed by Grant and Gen. Ord put in his place.

1877 - Eleven "Mollie Maguire" men, condemned for murder in the coal regions of Pennsylvania, hung at Pottsville, Pa.

1886 - United States Senate ratifies treaties with Japan and Mexico.

1898 - Landing of troops from the transport at Balquair, 17 miles east of Santiago de Cuba. The Spaniards on the island of Guam, one of the Mariana group, capitulated to the United States cruiser Charleston.

1900 - Republican national convention at Philadelphia nominated McKinley and Roosevelt.

1903 - The textile council declared the strike in the Lowell mills at an end; the strikers lost \$1,300,000 in wages.

1905 - The report of Supt. Hendricks of his investigation of the Equitable Life Assurance Society given to the public.
