THIS DAY IN HISTORY

1497.—John Cabot and his son, Sebastian, in the service of England, first described land on the continent of America, which they called Prima Vista, and is generally supposed to have been some part of Newfoundland.

1675.—King Phillip's war began at Swansey, in the Plymouth colony, not far from Mount Hope, having sent their wives and children to the Narragansetts for safety.

1796.—David Rittenhouse, an American natural philosopher, clock and mathematical instrument maker, became, by his own exertions, one of the most scientific men of the day.

1803.—Matthew Thornton, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, died. He was a practicing physician in New Hampshire when the war of the Revolution broke out.

1804.—The Governor of New Hampshire refused to sign the bill the Legislature had passed agreeing to the amendment to the constitution, adopted by two-thirds of the body.

1810.—Battle of Beaverdams; 570 Americans surprised and taken by the British.

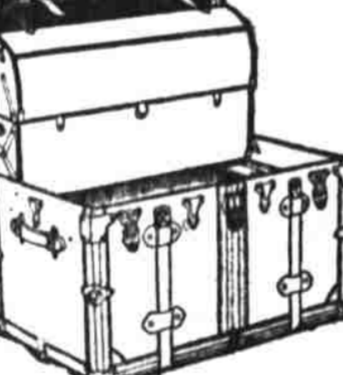
