Altona, Prussia, July 6.—It became known to-day that August Rosenberg, an alleged anarchist from Beattle, Wash, was arrested heres Tuesday, July 8, as he was leaving a train arriving at Altona. Acting on information re-ceived from the polics of New York, the authorities were watchins for Rosenberg, who has relatives living here. Rosenberg, who was accompa-nied by his wife, came to Europp on the Hamburg-American Line steamer Patricia, which left New York June 18 and arrived at Ham-burg June 29. The prisoner affirms that he is an American citizen. His baggage has been forwarded to anbaggage has been forwarded to an-other part of Germany and has not yet been searched by the police.

Berlin, July 6 .- The Rueue Hamarger Zeitung says that the chief of olice of Altona and Privy Councilor mhagen are inquiring into the case of Angust Rosenberg, recently arrested at Altona, who is strongly suspected of having planned an at-tempt on Emperor William's life. It is added that there are numerous overwheiming causes for suspicion and it is believed that only the man's arrest prevented the attempt. No bombs or explosives were found on bombs or explosives were found on Resenberg, who denies having participated in any plot. Cable mes-sages are continually being exchanged between the Altona and New York olice authorities.

# BOMBS IN HOUSE AT SEATTLE.

Evidence of Rosenberg's Murderous Designs Which Pacific Coast Police Designs Wi Obtained.

New York, July 6.—A dispatch com Seattle, Wash., on July 3, re-orted that the police of that city, cting at the instance of the Gerfrom man police, had raided the house formerly occupied by August Rosenberg, a bricklayer, and had found a plant for making bombs and infer-nal machines. Rosenberg jeft Seattle for Hamburg, Germany, on May 1. At that time the German government received a warning from Seattle that an attempt would be made to assasinate the German Emperor. The German consul at Scattle subsequently ecsived a telegram from Hamburg astructing him to investigate. The articles seized included more than 200 bottles of acids and explosives, crucibles, mortars, molds, a furnace and considerable scrap iron.

When he made his ascension at Providence on Wednesday, the wind was blowing a brisk breeze from the southwest, The aeronaut was carried in his balloon in a northeasterly direction and passed over the town of Attleboro. He had his balloon under perfect control at that time and while in the vicinity

in the direction of Brockton and the last seen of the aeronaut by observers on shore was when he passed over

Philadelphia Negro Who Murdered Four White Men of Crew of Schooner Harry A. Berwind and Threw Their Bodies Overboard Meets Death on Scaffold at Wil-mington Without Flinching—Made Verbal Statement Corroborating Written Confession in Which He Completely Exonerated Adams and Sawyer, Who Will Seek Pardon From Death Sentence. special to The Observer.

Wilmington, July 6.— After mak-ing a confession fully exonerating the other two surviving members of the crew from any part in the crime, Henry Scott, colored, was hanged in the county jail here this afternoon under semiones in the United States under sentence in the United States District Court for mutiny and mur-der aboard the Philadelphia schoon-er Harry A. Berwind off this coast last October. The hour of execution had been postponed, awaiting the re-turn of his counsel from Washington, where it was sought to get presi-dential intervention, which, however, failed.

CONFESSED TO CRIME.

In his confession Scott admitted killing Capt. E. B. Rumil and four others, all that composed the white men of the crew of the schooner Berwind, justifying himself with the statement that the crew was mal-treated and half fed. Arthur Adams and Robert Sawyer, the other two men, exonerated, are under sentence to die August 17th for their part in the crime, but in the light of the confession of Scott on the scaffold, it is expected that they will be either reprieved or pardoned by the Pres-

#### DISPLAYED REMARKABLE NERVE.

Scott is a Philadelphia negro and met death with the coolest nerve per-haps ever displayed by a man going to execution. He signified his repen-tance, asked that his body be turned over to Jefferson College, in Philadelphia, for scientific research or to some other college and told the marshal to see that the rope was all right, saying that he would give him the signal, which he did. He said he wanted no "humbuggery" about the execution and asked the United States marshal who sprung the trap to "make a home-run of it." Death ensued in 16 minutes from a broken neck. The execution of Henry Scott was in every way successful and was witnessed by about a hundred persons inside the rail enclosure, United States Marshal Dockery had made every preparation for the hanging and plans were carried out without hitch. Vote in Adams' Home Precinct Stood Twenty-One for Adams and Twenty-Two for Blackburn When Adams Men Bolted and Seperate Caucuses Were Held — Returns From Guil-ford Township Conventions Indicate That Blackburn Will Probably Con-trol Guilford Republican Conven-tion To-Day—Feeling is High and Strenuous Contest is in Prospect. Greensboro, July 6.-The Republi-can precinct convention in the first precinct of the city, in which Judge Adams resides, was held in White's photograph gallery at 3 o'clock this afternoon and resulted in the election afternoon and resulted in the election of two delegations to the convention which meets to-morrow. The con-vention elected as a temporary chair-man, Mr. A. W. Malone, who married a niece of Judge Adams, and who is advertising manager of The Duily In-dustrial News. The candidate of the Blackburn faction for chairman was Eugene Eckel, but it seems that some of the voters misunderstood the situa-tion or failed to have ballots and the tion or failed to have ballots and the Adams candidate was elected by a vote of 22 to 14.

Judge Adams, it is said, made a short speech in which he called upon short speech in which he called upon the Republicans present to vote for him, saying that Blackburn had boasted that he could not carry his own precinct. The State chairman said they would show them. The Adams faction nominated A. W. Ma-lone and C. A. Starbuck as delegates lone and C. A. Starbuck as delegates to the county convention and the Blackburn faction nominated J. T. decided that the method of voting should be by standing in rows, the Adams men on one side of the room and the Blackburn men on the other. When the sheep and goats were sepa-rated, the vote stood for Adams deledates, 21; Blackburn delegates, 22. Judge Adams, when the vote was announced, said there must be mistake and a recount was made with the same result. The Adams men would not allow Malone, who did their bidding, to announce the vote until they had gone out on the streets and endeavored to secure other votes. ### WARSAW POLICE TO RESIGN,

Guardians of the Peace Terrorized by Assassination at the Hands of Rev-Intionists.

Warsaw, Russian Poland, July 6.-The reign of crime and terrorism is so great here that the police have de-cided to resign. A few days ago, as a measure of protection against as-sastination by the revolutionists, the system of police beats was abandoned and the police were formed into pa-trols for self-protection against bomb-throwing, etc. But this only made it easier for the terrorists to shoot them. The Governor General, when apprised of the decision of the police to resign, threatened to ar-rost and punish those who failed to appear for duty.
