CONTEST OVER BRIDGE.

Sound Breeds Contention at Eliza-beth City—Edenton People Opposed

Special to The Observer.

Elizabeth City, July 10.—Public opinion in this section seems very much divided on the question of the bridge across the Albemarle sound, which the Norfolk & Southern Railroad proposes to build, connecting Edenton and Mackey's Ferry. It has been the chief topic of conversation in Elizabeth City since the matter was first mentioned, especially since resolutions favoring the construction were presented at the meeting of the chamber of commerce July 2d. At that meeting, considerable opposition developed and the fight grew so bitter that the matter was referred to a committee to report at the next meeting, which would ordinarily have been August 6th, but yesterday the champresident issued a call for a special meeting last night to consider the

This procedure led to a fight in the very beginning. Mr. J. H. LeRoy, a prominent wholesale merchant and general manager of the Virginia-Carolina Inland Steamship Company, led the movement, claiming that the meeting was illegally called in an effort to rush the matter through in the interest of the railroad. This was indignantly denied. Mr. E. F. Aydlett, attorney, reported for the committee the adoption of the resolution, making his speech along the line of increased advantages in transporta-tion and the shortening of the time required for travel. Mr. LeRoy took floor and charged a concocted plan to rush the resolution through. Mr. Aydlett, he said, was attorney for the Norfolk & Southern and was working for their interests. This. Mr. Aydlett denied, but Mr. LeRoy said that he was attorney for the Suffolk & Carolina, which was absorbed by the Virginia-Carolina Coast Railroad, which was in turn taken over by the Norfolk & Southern. In reply, Mr. Aydlett intimated that Mr. LeRoy was opposing the resolutions on ac-count of his connection with a steamboat line, which is a strong competitor of the Norfolk & Southern. The matter was finally put to a vote and the resolutions were adopted by an over-

whelming majority.
