TRADES STRIKE FAILS. The strike in the building trades has completely petered out. Notwith-standing a great hurran it never amounted to anything very serious. The mass of the membership of the unions had no heart in it. There was no grievance on hours and wages, Extremists insisted upon demanding recognition of the union and other such technical matters. Contractors positively refused to accede and as none of the demands were material to the welfare of the men now or in the future the strike fell through. That, lowever, does not mean that unionism has been displaced for the "open shop" principle, for in practically every line of industry in Columbia unionism prevails. It has not, however, as a rule been excessive or unreasonable in its demands, consequently the troubles that have ariseq have been generally of a trivial char-

Broke Rifle Records

In smashing former records, Mr. Wright's crack shooting equaled if it didn't excel the records held by members of some of the best rifle teams in the country. At the first shoot of ten rounds he made a score of 87 out of a possible of 100. The world's record is 88 out of possible 160, made by the same man twice, but ten years apart. In the second shoot Mr. Wright made a score of 79, or a total for the two shoots of 166 out of a possible 200. The Asheville Rifle Club shoots at a distance of 200 yards and at the first shoot Mr. Wright hit the bull's eye eight times out of 10 shots.
