The person committing the robbery was compelled to operate from the front and in plant view of passersby. With some instrument he plugged a hole in the plate-glass front and then helped himself to articles of jewelry placed in the window for show. The

hole that was broken in the window is the size of a small watermelon and almost round. The glass was cracked in a number of places but not shattered. The window looks as though a cannon ball had smoothly cut its way through. It is not thought that the robber secured anything of much value as the more expensive articles carried by the firm are nightly placed in a large safe. Just now a plate-glass window could have been broken on Patton avenue and a robbery committed, without being detected is unaccountable.

PAINTERS QUIT WORK.

Two Squads Walk Out at Durham Following Refusal of Demands for Shorter Hours—Secretary of Union Says Strike is Unauthorized. Special to The Observer.

Durham, July 16. - The union painters in Durham, at least several squads of painters are on a strike that was inaugurated this morning. From what can be learned at this time the painters are asking for a nine-hour day with the same pay that has been given them for ten hours' work. Two forces quit work this morning when the demands made were refused and it is probable that all of the union painters in the city will join in the demand for shorter hours at the same

It is stated to-night by the local secretary of the painters' union that it was not a strike when the few men quit work to-day and that he did not wish the impression to get out that there was a strike. He said that the painters had made demands for a reduction in the number of hours of work and that everything was getting along nicely when four or five men guit work on their own account, trying, as they claimed, to force the mand made. The secretary said that was not ordered by the union and that the union was not backing the move, stating that it was the act of individuals. It is not now antici-pated that there will be a strike of the painters here.
