WANTS PURE-MEAT CRUSADE.

Secretary Wilson Says It is Now Up to States and Cities to Clean Up Es-tablishments Doing Only State and Local Business.

Washington, July 21.—Discussing the new meat inspection law to-day, Secretary Wilson said that there was considerable misapprehension regard-ing its scope. It does not, he said, apply to any but slaughtering and ment packing houses doing an inter-State business.

"If the people of this country," said the Secretary, "Want to be assured that the meat that goes into sured that the meat that goes into their homes from those establish-ments doing a purely State and local business is clean and wholesome, they should enter upon a crusade for a general cleaning up. I am powerless, myself, to act. Quite recently I went through some of these houses not em-braced within the Federal law and found them in a nasty, filthy condition and in some cases using disease tion and in some cases that animals. It is my one regret that the Federal law does not reach them, but I earnestly hope the State and city officials will look after them as vigoricals orously as we propose to look after the others."

It is understood, however, that the amount is large and that the plaintiffs will fight the case through all the courts. Mr. Lancaster has employed the local law firm of Parker & Bourne as counsel.

NEGRO PROJECTS REJECTED.

Plans for Espenditure of \$100.000 Appropriated by Congress for Exhibit at Jamestown All Turned Down by Secretary of Government Board.

Washington, July 2t.—Unfavorable consideration was given looday by Secretary J. H. Edwards of the government board for the Jamestown Exposition, to several projects submitted by a committee from the Negro Development Company, organized in connection with the exposition. The committee, which was headed by Giles B. Jackson, a negro lawyer of Richmond, Va. outlined plans for the exponditure of the appropriation of 100,000 made in the closing days of the session of Congress for an exhibit of negro development on the American continent. The committee asked that none but members of their race should participate in the design and construction of the building which is to be erected for the exhibit at a cost of \$15,000. In this way a special chance would be given to show what negro architects, masons and bricklayers could do, they thought. The rolling on their proposal was that the government latends to make no discrimination on any of the work done out of its appropriation. The committee also proposed that \$13,000 should be expended for bringing a native village from the heart of Africa to serve as a contrast to the state reached by the race in this country.

Another portion of the appropriation amounting to \$1000. It was suggested, should be used for charts and text books illustrating the propriess of the race with a view to providing text books for negro schools. For the position of disbursing agent of the fund the committee urged the candidacy of R. T. Hill, a negro cashier of the True Reformers' Bank, of Richmond. The government board found these projects unacceptable.

NINE DROWN AT VANCONNEX.

Steel Steamer Runs Down and Cuts in Two Small Vessel Bearing Party of 15 Business Men.

Vancouver, B. C., July II.—Nine persons lost their lives this afternoon by an accident which occurred on Burrard Inlet, the harbor of Vancouver. The steamer Chehalis was run down and cut in two by the steel steamer Princess Victoria, leaving this port for Victoria and Seattle. The Chehalis had on board a party of 15 Bound for the oyster beds at Blunden harbor, on the northern coast of British Columbia. The party included the owners of the beds and representatives of the English syndicate which contemplated purchasing the oyater beds.


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
