The fact that a Governor had been subjected to such an outrage has been suppressed carefully for a year for fear of creating undestred political

prejudices.
The hold-up episcode, as related by those close to the Governor, occurred while he was the guest of Tammany Hall as one of the orators at the 4th of July celebration last summer Governor Glenn and Lieutenant Gov ernor Sanders, of Louisiana, another guest, at the conclusion of the ceremonies were invited to join a party going to Coney Island.

There was a deliberate effort, ac-cording to the Governor, to get him drunk, several of the party being intoxicated. The Governor, however, had been discreet and was unaffected. They stopped at Henderson's restaurant and wine was ordered.

Scarcely had they seated them-selves when one of the men-a district leader, it is said-drew from his pocket a legally drafted pardon in favor of a gold-brick artist named Halsey or Halstead, then doing time at Raleigh, North Carolina, but whose headquarters were between the Battery and Fourteenth street. ATTEMPT MADE TO GET PARDON.

Thinking the Governor was suffidently jovial to sign anything by that lme, the leader remarked:

"Just a favor, Governor, We would like you to sign this and let that man come back to New York."
Governor Glenn told the leader that a petition had been presented to him just before he left home for that man's pardon; that he had looked into the case, and had decided in the negative. He was sorry, but he could not reverse himself then, even to oblige his hosts. The man is reported to have become ugly, and shouted that the Governor would not get out alive if the pardon was not signed. Some allege that a revolver was bran lished.

The Governor rose from the table and said:

If I have any friends in this crowd. I wish they would come on this side of the table, for there's likely to be mething doing here pretty soon." I'll stand by you, Governor,' reunded Lieutenant Governor Saners. The remainder of the party asumed an ettitude of helpless intoxi-
