THIS DAY IN HISTORY. 1776.—Forces of the northern American army under Washington, 10,814 men, for duty, 2,643 sick, 2,846 on command, 57 on furlough, total 17,325. The smallpox was committing great ravages at this time, 6,500 having died at it since April, inoculation being prohibited in general orders.

1778.—Fort Boonesborough invested by 450 Canadians and Indians. The fort was garrisoned by 45 men, who defended it with great spirit against every stratagem till the 10th, when the siege was abandoned and its capture never again attempted.

1804.—The harbor of New York blockaded by the British. 1813.—The United States troops under General Hull evacuated Canada and entered Detroit.

1814.—First meeting of the British and American commissioners at Ghent to treat for peace. 1826.—The centennial of Baltimore celebrated.

1838.—The Chilian squadron of 32 vessels landed 6,000 men at Ancón and demanded two millions of dollars, which, not being granted, they advanced and took Callao and Lima, after an action in which 2,000 were killed.

1846.—President Polk vetoed the French spoliation bill, on the ground that it had not been sufficiently considered and that the money could not be spared in time of war.

1861.—Fort Gaines at Mobile Bay, surrenders to Farragut, 818 men and 26 guns. 1864.—So many men of Chicago and the State of Illinois were being recruited by agents for other States that Governor Yates issued an order barring such agents.

1866.—Emma Dowager Queen of the Sandwich Islands, arrives at New York as national guest. 1884.—The bodies of those who died in the Greeley Arctic expedition received at Governor's Island, N. Y., with military honors.

1893.—Skirmish near Quaxams, Fort to Ripon, in which five of the Fourth Ohio were wounded. 1903.—Lieut. Gen. S. B. M. Young assumed command of the army; Lieut. Gen. Miles retired.

1904.—Collapse of a bridge at Dry creek, Pueblo, Colo., caused a railroad wreck in which 76 persons were killed and many injured.
