

DR. JACK LINDSAY ILL.

South River Gilliam Sustains Stroke of Paralysis—Journal of the Late Capt. E. B. C. Hambley Posthumously Illustrating Lynching Are Unavailable.

Salisbury, Aug. 15.—The city is tonight and following the announcement that Capt. Jack Lindsay, of South River, is in an unconscious state as the result of a stroke of paralysis. There are no physicians nearer South River than Salisbury and Capt. Lindsay is now being attended by one from here. It is not certain whether his trouble is paralysis or heart failure.

No announcement of any county men could be more sorrowful. Capt. Lindsay is a native Scotchman and one of the cleverest old gentlemen in the world. There is the slightest hope for him. He was sitting in his chair on the front piazza reading a paper when he fell to the floor and has not since spoken. This occurred about 1 o'clock. The relatives of Mr. Lindsay were notified and the best skill will be employed to bring to his own this charming old gentleman who has reached the age of 65 years.
