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NORTH CAROLINA IN NAVY

THE STATE WELL REPRESENTED. No admiral, Rear Admiral or Captain. The well-known Commanders are from the Old North State.

BY W. W. PRICE. Special to The Observer. Washington, Aug. 19.—The last official gazette of the Navy Department issued to-day shows that North Carolina is well represented in the naval service of the United States.

There are no admirals, rear admirals or captains in the service accredited to the State, but she has three commanders.

Commander Reginald F. Nicholson is attached to the Bureau of Navigation, this city; Commander James T. Smith is commanding the Tacoma, and Commander James P. Parker is ordnance officer at the Portsmouth navy yard.

There are six lieutenant commanders as follows: Edwin A. Anderson, commanding the second torpedo flotilla; Andrew T. Long, commanding the second torpedo flotilla; David, on the Illinois; Thomas Washington, attached to the Bureau of Navigation, this city; Archibald H. Seales, commanding the Severn; George Mallory, in inspection duty with the Bureau of Equipment, this city.

MANY LIEUTENANTS. Lieutenants from North Carolina are in the following places: Robert W. McNeely is on the new battleship Louisiana, just completed at Newport News; Walter S. Turpin is on the navy yard, this city; James E. Walker is on the Wisconsin; Rufus Z. Johnson, Jr., is attached to the Bureau of Navigation; Pope Washington is on the Dolphin; Lynn A. Cotton is on the Pennsylvania; Hollis T. Winston has been ordered to the new cruiser Charleston; Frederick J. Oliver is on the Don Juan de Austria; Robert W. McNeely is on the Maine; Percy Poole is on the cruiser Baltimore, and John F. Green is on the Indiana.

Ensigns from the Tar Heel State are placed as follows: Adolphus Stetson is on the Cleveland; Oscar F. Cooper is on the Minneapolis; and David W. Bagley is on the Concord. Midshipmen are as follows: John H. Ferguson is on the Pennsylvania; Louis P. Davis is on the Kearsarge; John J. London is on the Pennsylvania; Alexander S. Wadsworth, Jr., is on the Rainbow; George B. Bryan is on the Illinois; William H. Stevenson is on the Minneapolis; and Mathias E. Manley is on the Kearsarge.

BUT ONE SURGEON. There is but one surgeon accredited to the State, and that is Victor C. B. Adams, who is now at the naval and marine recruiting station, San Francisco. Julian T. Miller is acting assistant surgeon, appointed for temporary duty in 1905. He is now on the receiving ship Frankfort. North Carolina has fewer members of the medical corps than any other State in the Union.

Paymaster William T. Gray is attached to the naval hospital, Yokohama; Past Assistant Paymaster Emmett C. Gudgeon is assistant to the general storekeeper at the New York navy yard, and Past Assistant Paymaster Frederick H. Turley is the commissary officer on the Hancock at the same place.

No chaplains are accredited to North Carolina. In the marine corps William B. Lemley is assistant quartermaster and is located in this city; Captain Herbert J. Hirschinger is at the Marine Barracks, Annapolis, Md.; First Lieutenant Thomas A. Mott is at the marine barracks, this city, and Second Lieutenant John H. Thompson is at the marine barracks, Cavite, Philippine Islands.

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COLORED OLD FELLOWS

Annual Meeting Held at Newbern. Officers Elected for the ensuing Year—Salisbury Chosen as the Place for the Next Meeting.

The District Grand Lodge of Colored Odd Fellows which spent its three days' session in this city, Tuesday morning at Odd Fellows Hall, Pasteur street, completed its business Thursday night. Much routine and other business was transacted; one important measure was the advance of the value of the endowment policies 50 per cent.

The annual address of the grand master, W. W. Lawrence, showed the order to be in highly creditable condition in every respect and making rapid progress in this State. The body, which composes about 250 delegates, visited the Odd Fellows Home, seven miles out on the Wilmington railroad, Wednesday, ostensibly to review the plantation of 1,400 acres with abundant lumber and wood supplies, saw mill in operation, numerous buildings and large tracts of fertile land.

Of course much surprise was expressed as the magnitude and extent of this valuable purchase, two-thirds of which, \$5,000, has been promptly paid. Attorney D. E. Henderson, on behalf of the mayor and citizens, made the welcome address to the Grand Lodge delegates at St. Peter's church, Tuesday night, where an excellent programme of welcome exercises was carried out. Rev. B. F. Martin, of Gastonia, made the response to Mr. Henderson's address. A district grand master session was occupied with election of officers, resulting as follows:

Vick, endowment secretary, Wilson; Y. D. Garrett, state grand director, Tarboro; W. W. Lawrence, Newbern; Home, W. W. Lawrence, Newbern; associate directors, W. A. Fuller, Franklinton; E. M. Green, Wilmington; W. S. Miller, W. W. Lawrence, who has served as district grand master for five successive terms, was heartily and unanimously endorsed for membership on the sub-committee of management, and the delegates instructed to so vote. Following the creditable street parade Thursday, p. m., the annual oration was made at the court house by J. C. Ashbury, editor of the Odd Fellows Journal, Philadelphia, and was eloquent, practical, and abounded good sense and wholesome advice. The delegates and visitors appeared well pleased with their cordial reception and good treatment by the people of Newbern. The next session of the Grand Lodge will be held at Salisbury, second Tuesday in August, 1907. A levee was held Thursday night at the Tobacco House. The annual address contains recommendations for a levy of 20 cents per capita upon 10,000 members of the order throughout the State, to meet the next payment on the mortgage note of the home, and the establishment of a fire insurance scheme, and an official State Odd Fellows Journal, of which Rev. R. G. Green, Winston-Salem, was made the editor, all of the foregoing recommendations being endorsed.

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THIS DAY IN HISTORY

1691.—William Penn colonized in his province of Pennsylvania, which had been taken from him and annexed to New York.

1748.—Fort Massachusetts, situated in the town of Adams, surrendered to the French and Indians. It was garrisoned with 22 men under Capt. Hawley when attacked by 500 French and Indians. The little band kept the horse at bay while their ammunition lasted, and then capitulated on promise of protection, to be humanely treated and none delivered to the Indians. In violation of the terms, Vaudreuil delivered one-half to the irritated savages while the loss of the enemy was afterwards ascertained to have been 47.

1794.—Battle of Miami, Ohio, between the United States troops under Gen. Wayne and the British and Indians. The latter were defeated and driven out of the United States. The most hostile tribes were the Wyandots, Delaware, Shawnee and Miami. The number of Indians engaged in this battle was 2,000; that of the United States troops did not amount to 900.

1804.—An interesting petition was prepared by the citizens of Louisiana and presented to Congress, praying for admittance to the Union, and allowing them all rights and privileges of citizens.

1847.—The Mexican works at Contreras, near the City of Mexico, carried by General Smith's command. A severe battle was fought between the Mexicans completely routed. Many were slain on both sides.

1849.—Major Emory, in the United States service, gave information that the river forty feet wide and more than waist deep, with good, drinkable water, broke forth between the desert about this time, between the river Gila and the mountain range.

1852.—The steamboat Atlantic came in collision on Lake Erie with the propeller Ogdensburg, and sank in half an hour. Of 500 passengers, 250 were lost.

1864.—Capt. William J. Livingston, of the Confederate army, was hanged as a spy at St. Louis, Mo.

1869.—The Chinese embassy in Boston.

1898.—The New York, Brooklyn, Massachusetts, Indiana, Texas, Oregon and Iowa joined in a grand naval parade in New York harbor.

1903.—The Grand Army of the Republic, in annual encampment at San Francisco, elected Gen. John C. Black, of Illinois, commander-in-chief.
