FANCIFUL STORIES OF FEVER IN CHARLOTTE.

Reports which are very much exaggerated have gone abroad as to the prevalence of typhoid fever in Charoffe, and even in the city there may be misconception as to the extent to which the disease prevails. It is of course unfortunate that there is any at all, but there nearly always is and his is true of practically all commumities of this size. Exaggeration, owever, is hurtful to the city abroad and disquieting to our own people, and nothing but harm can result from inflating the facts.

Believing attempted concealment about such things to be the very worst possible policy, it has been that of The Observer to deal with the public in a spirit of perfect frankness. If there had been at any time an epidemic in the city of this disease the public would have been advised, but there is not and has not been anything entitled to be so characterized; yet, in view of harmful reports we have solicited of Dr. J. C. Montgomery, secretary of the Charlotte Academy of Medicine, an authoritative statement




