Statement—By Increase in Sales of Stocks for August Over Last Year. New York, Sept. 1.—Extreme duliness marked the course of to-day's brief session on the stock exchange. The halting tone of the market was doubtless due largely to concern regarding the showing of the associated banks in their weekly returns. Just as on the previous day, Mnien Pacific was the leader. If so duli market could be said to have one. The lock, on buying of the same character is that previously noted, rose close to its record price, and before the end of the hour established a bisher price than before. Bt. Paul also exhibited much strength and the gain there was a general disposition to couple the movements of these stocks as part of some of the colossal deal. The bank statement exceeded the most sanguine expectations, loans decreasing about \$7,600,000, with the bash loas much below general estimates.

The showing leaves the excess reserves at \$8,8000, as against \$5,500,000 in the corresponding week last year. The list became much more animated on the publication of the statement, with a general upward movement. Union Pacific advancing to 194%, but closing at a fractional decline This represents a net rise of over 30 points since August 17, the date of the Pacific dividend announcements. The final trading disclosed some realizing for profits, but the tone was fairly strong. Returns of the Louisville & Nashville Road for July showed a gain of over \$100,000 in net carnings, while those of the Rock Island-Frisco system for the same period increased almost \$175,000. Bank clearings throughout the country for the week increased over \$5 per cent. Sales of stock on the exchange exceeded those of the same month last year by over 11,500,000 shares, though bond sales decreased over \$3,-00,000.
