IMPORTED MEAT NOT INCLUDED

Products Dealt With in Pure Food
Washington, Sept. 27.—The Secretary of Agriculture has just received
from the Attorney General the text
of the important opinion rendered by
the latter answering in the negative
the question submitted to him as to
whether or not the meat-inspection
inv passed at the last session of Congress applied to meat products imported into the United States from
foreign countries. The Attorney General says the question as to the application to such articles was of considerable importance, as immense quantities of sausage, gelatine, meat extract and other meat food porducts
are imported every year.

are imported every year.

Mr. Moody held that the provisions of the meat inspection amendments has reference entirely to domestic slaughtering and meat packing estab-lishments. The matter of imported meats and meat products, the Attor-ney General said, was not referred to at all in the meat inspection amendat all in the meat inspection amend-ment, but had been dealt with by Con-gress in the pure food law, which had been enacted at the same time. The pure food law, he pointed out, spe-difically prohibited the introduction from any foreign country, or the transportation in inter-State com-

merce, of impure, adulterated or mis-branded articles of food and drink, and provided that food should be considered adulterated within the meaning of the act if, among other things. "It consists in whole or in part of a filthy, decomposed or putrid ani-mal or vegetable substance, or any portion of an animal unfit for food, whether manufactured or not, or it is the product of a diseased animal, or one that has died otherwise than by slaughter." This act, he said, plainly contemplated the importation and de-livery through the channels of inter-State commerce to the consignees and purchasers of imported meat food products which were pure, wholesome and unadulterated, and therefore Congress could not, in the meat inpec-tion amendment, have inteded to ex-clude them from such transportation.

FOR PLOT AGAINST CASTOR.

Five Revolutionary Agents Indicted in New York on Charge of Having in Their Possession Dies for Counter-feiting Venezuelan Silver Dollars.

New York, Sept. 27 .- The attempts of a revolutionary body to overthrow President Castro, of Venezuela, is said to be the indirect cause to-day of the indicting of five men by the Federal grand jury on the charge of having dies in their possession for the making of Venezuelan silver dollars. The indicted men are Captain George Boynton and Louis M. Thompson, the alleged agents of the revolutionary movement; Theodore Wilcox, Sidney P. Keller and Joseph F. Keller. The Kellers, who are engaged in the die-making business in this city, as well as Thompson and Wilcox, pleaded not guilty when arraigned. Boynton could not be located

Captain Boynton and Thompson were arraigned before Commissioner Ridgeway, Tuesday, on the same com-plaint, but were discharged on the ground that the crime, if any, was not committed or intended to be com-mitted in the United States, but on an island-in the mouth of the Orinoco river, which is in South American territory. Chief Flynn, of the United States Secret Service, was not satisfied with the discharge of the men and brought the case before the grand jury. All save Wilcox were held in \$2,000 ball. The Wilcox bonds were fixed at \$1,000.
