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ANOTHER MILL FOR GASTONIA.

It Will Have a Capital of \$100,000 and Will Make Fine Yarns-To be Built Early Next Spring. Special to The Observer.

Gastonia, Sept. 28 .- Gastonia is to have another cotion mill, an application for a charter having already been sent to the Secretary of State. The capital, \$100,000, has nearly all most been subscribed and work on the buildings will begin in the early opring. The mill will have 5,000 spindles and will manufacture fine yarns. It will be operated by electric power from the Spencer Mountain Power Company or from the Southern Power Company, The principal stockholders are. Mr. L. F. Groves, Mr. G. A. Gray and Mr. J. R. Withers, all successful cotton mill men of the town. Mr. Withers, at present superintendent of the Ozark Cotton Mill, will be superintendent. The plant will probably be located on the LaFar farm east of town.
