The new law relating to vagrants is found in section \$740 of the new code and is as follows:

If any person shall come within any of the following classes, he shall be deemed a vagrant, and shall be fined not exceeding \$50 or imprisoned not exceeding \$50 days:

1. Persons wandering or strolling about in idleness who are able to work and have no property to support them.

2. Persons leading an idle, immoral or profligate life who have no property to support them and who are able to work and do not work. 3. All persons who are able to work.

a. All persons who are able to work, having no property to support them, and who have not some visible and known means of a fair, honest and reputable livelihood.

4. Persons having a fixed abode who have no visible property to support them and who live by stealing, or trading in, bartering for or buying stolen property. ing stolen property.

5. Professional gamblers living in

6. All able-bodied men who have no other visible means of support who shall live in idleness upon the wages or earnings of their mother, wife or minor child or children, except male


