His opening speech of one hour has never been surpassed in this town. He charged that Butler was stopped from attacking the Democratic State administration and quoted from The Clinton Caucasian an editorial published in 1892 in which Butler declared that the Democratic State administration prior to that date was above criticism. He also read from The Raleigh Caucasian editorials published in 1897 in which Butler declared that the Legislature of 1897 was a damnable disgrace to the State, that it was composed of a set of miserable pie-hunters and that no bill could be passed unless it was in the interest of some job. Turning to Butler, he demanded to know when he was telling the truth, in 1892 and 1897, or now after he has turned Radical. He demanded that Butler own or repudiate these utterances of his own paper and paused to give him the opportunity to do so but the ex-Senator remained silent in his seat and attempted no reply in his rejoinder.

The most dramatic incident in the debate occurred when Mr. Pou re-

most dramatic incident in the debate occurred when Mr. Pou replied to Butler's denunciation of the Democratic party for the riots which occurred in 1898 and 1900. Turning to him and shaking his finger, Mr. Pou cried, "You, Senator Butler, are responsible for the Wilmington riot more than any other man, living or dead. You betrayed your own party and sold out to the men who were leading the negroes in 1900. The negroes demanded recognition in the city of Wilmington and you helped to put forty negro magistrates in office. Half the police force of the city were negroes. Nearly all the deputy sheriffs of that city were negroes. Robberies were committed in open day time. were committed in open day time. Burglaries were committed time and again within the shadow of the city hall. White women were knocked from the sidewalk by drunken negroes. There was such a carnival of crime as the city has never seen before. You are a white man and you ought to be conscious of the things a white man will not submit to. I do. I think I deplore it even as much as you do, but I tell you to your face it does not lie in your mouth to criticize the people of Wilmington or the people of any other town in this State for the things they did to rid themselves of the infamous rule forced up-on them by you and your Republican allies. You forced the people of Wilmington to do what they did and you are the last man on earth to abuse them or criticize them. When you abuse Senator Simmons you abuse a better man than you have ever been. The reason you hate him is because he drove you and your negro allies from power and because the people of North Carolina gave him your seat

in the Senate." Mr. Pou's speech more than satis-fied the Democrats present. The de-bate will undoubtedly cripple the influence of Mr. Butler with his own people, if anything can do that.
