

OUTLOOK FOR PARLIAMENT

WORDS AND COMMONS AT ODDS

Which begins Tuesday will be marked by strenuous conflict between the House over Education Bill and Appeal to the Country...

London, Oct. 21.—Parliament will re-assemble next Tuesday with two vexatious controversies before it and the meeting promises to attract renewed attention to public questions.

Joseph Chamberlain sends word that his indisposition will be of brief duration and that he expects to return before long and continue his tariff propaganda.

The indications are that Arthur S. Balfour will continue in his old place as opposition leader, with Lord Lansdowne directing the opposition forces in the House of Lords.

It is not likely that the government will initiate any legislation beyond that foreshadowed in the King's speech, together with that which was left over from the spring sitting.

The session which begins on Tuesday will be marked by two conflicts, one between the House of Lords and the House of Commons over the education bill, and the other between the government and the Labor party over the workmen's compensation bill.

The controversy between the House of Lords and the House of Commons over the education bill may lead to serious consequences, and possibly result in an appeal to the country.

The main purpose of the bill, that of giving the country a better educational system, is for the time being forgotten in the interest of the strife between the two houses.

The Irish question is a slumbering volcano which may break out at any moment, but there is believed to be a tacit understanding that it will go over to the next session for full discussion.

Meantime the Irish leaders, notably John Redmond here and T. F. O'Connor, in the United States, are indicating that the government's co-operation of anything short of complete home rule will be unacceptable to the Irish party.

TWO HYMNS EXCLUDED

"Nearer, My God, to Thee" and "Lead, Kindly Light" Forbidden.

Bishop John J. O'Connor, of the Catholic Diocese of Newark, has issued instructions to the pastors of the churches under his direction to discontinue the singing of "Nearer, My God, to Thee" and "Lead, Kindly Light" in the churches after the conclusion of services if the pastor saw fit to permit it, but under no consideration was heard in any church under his jurisdiction.

The bishop declared the law of the Church did not permit the singing of any hymn that is not part of the liturgical services and he added "Nearer, My God, to Thee" is no more a part of the service than is "In the Sweet By and By." The hymn is purely sentimental, while "Lead, Kindly Light" is an appeal for spiritual light, but there isn't any reason for its being sung in the churches.

The liturgical service is in Latin, and although the singing of an English translation of a part of the liturgy or a Psalm, etc., is sanctioned, it is an iron rule of the Church not to allow the singing of songs not included in music receiving the approbation of the proper authorities.

"Lead, Kindly Light" was written by Cardinal Newman before his conversion to the Catholic religion. The two hymns now forbidden have been sung frequently of late in the Catholic churches.

BRYAN PLANS A NEW FAIRTY.
