Mr. John Radigan, a well-known miner, came across an old map of Cripple Creek, the Colorado mining region. Opening the map and point-ing to the independence mine, he shid: "In 1893 I bad an option on

Instead of loading his gold figure on the rtain, as was the usual custom, he put it in wagons and hauled it through to Denver, a distance of 100 miles, and sold it without creating any excitement. The first haul of ore


