Carthage, Nov. 14.—Mr. B. L. Maness died here last night after four days' severe illness with pneumonia. Mr. Maness was a prominent contractor and builder and had done a great deal of work in this line in this section of the State in the past few years. He was 26 years of age and was married to a young woman who has several brothers and sisters, all grown. He was born and reared in the county of which he was a strong Republican, though he was very tolerant towards those who differed with him. He was the nominee of his party for sheriff of the county in the late election, but was defeated by his Democratic opponent. The exposure which he was subjected to in the county canvass has doubtless laid the foundation for the disease which proved fatal to him last night. Mr. Ransom Burns, of Fayetteville. Burns, one of the best known and most popular men in North Carolina. Mr. Burns was a faithful soldier in the late war, serving in the correspondent's position in the company of Capt. D. W.
