ANDREW THE CARNEGVITE AND HIS FAME.

Cable disputches tell of a striking article entitled "My Partners, the People." by Andrew Carnegie, in The London Review of Reviews. Col. Carnegie expresses the belief that a millionaire ought to share with the poor, but with the limitation that his fortune shall be kept intact until his death. Then the community should exact a large share on some such basis as the British death duties al-

ready provide. "Such contributions from the owners of enormous fortunes at their death." he says, "would do much to reconcile dissatisfied but fairminded people to the slarmingly unequal distribution of wealth arising from the new industrial conditions of our day. We shall ultimately have to consider the adoption of some such scheme as a progressive tax on all fortunes beyond a certain amount. either given in life or bequeathed at death, so that it will be impossible for the owners of enormous fortunes to hand on more than a certain amount to any individual." Col. Carnegie has a low opinion of the moneymaking instinct and humbly deprecates the claim of the merely wealthy to fame. In the coming day, he says,

It is now stated in London that the apanese government has been quisty informed that under no circumstances would Great Britain contemplate any such unforeseen development of the obligations imposed upon her by the treaty of 1905 as the operation of the Anglo-Japanese alhas been remedjed as far as possible and there can be little room to doubt. that Japan, for the purpose of a war with the United States, could not obtain from England that financial support with which the Mikado's empire, even, singly, would be extremely formidable and without which it can only bide its time.
