Fletch-er, of No. 159 Haywood struct, met with a painful accident lats yesterday after-poon some six miles from Asheville, while specing over the highway in his automobile. At the time of the accident Dr. Fletcher was traveling alone. It seems that at some point on the high-way a dog ran out in front of the ma-chine. The action of the aforesaid ca-nine was featured by swiftness. The physician had neither time nor oppor-unity to check the speed of the auto or turn it from its cours in order to avoid collision with the animal. In comse-guence one wheel of the machine struck the dog and almost instantly dam-sge resulted. The machine was turned violently and Dr. Fletcher was thrown to the ground, and in some manner be-came entangled in the auto. His right arm was fractured between the wrist and
