HAS AN EYE TO BUSINESS.

The Wife of James Rucker, Sentenced to Hang, Tries to Insure His Life, But Insurance People Get Wise.

Asheville, April 18.—The latest ripple in insurance circles was the effort made this week by the wife of James Rucker to have the life of James insured. It so happens that Rucker is a negro, and that likewise he is under sentence of death for the criminal assault of his step-daughter several months ago. His case will go before the Supreme Court at its next session and, if the decision of the lower court is affirmed, Rucker will hang. The insurance company through which Rucker's wife desired to carry the insurance was considering the application, when its officer remembered Rucker as the condemned man. The application was very promptly turned down.

ROUGH RIDER GETS THE PLACE.

Capt. George C. Curry Chosen as Successor to Governor Hagerman, of New Mexico.

Washington, April 18.—Governor Hagerman, of New Mexico, against whom charges were preferred, has tendered his resignation to the President to-day and announced the appointment of Capt. George C. Curry, Governor of Samar Province, Philippine Islands, as Governor of New Mexico in Governor Hagerman's place. Governor Hagerman was recently in Washington to answer the charges, which related to the transfer of territorial lands to a Pennsylvania development company. While here he had a long interview with the President and Secretary Garfield about the charges, which he declared were the result of political intrigue. Captain Curry enlisted in the Rough Rider Regiment from Talarosa, New Mexico.

IN SPLENDID CONDITION.

A Meeting of the Board of Directors Shows the Very Healthy State of Affairs of the Marlboro Cotton Mills.

McColl, S. C., April 18.—At a meeting of the board of directors of the Marlboro Cotton Mills, held at the company's office here to-day, the regular 2 per cent. quarterly dividend was declared, payable the 27th inst. The quarterly statement issued by the company shows a net gain of \$65,000 for the quarter, which is 2 1/2 per cent. on the capital stock. The mills have goods sold ahead for several months, with cotton bought to cover same, thus insuring continued prosperity. The statement also shows a loss and gain account of \$255,353.71 which, taken together, places the mills in splendid condition financially.

Negro Preacher Held for Unlawfully Marrying Couple.

Rochester, N. Y., April 18.—Rev. W. F. Coffey, pastor of an African church at Olean, was arrested last night on the charge of unlawfully marrying Arthur Jones, colored, and Dora Hitchcock, white. Coffey was held for the grand jury in the sum of \$500. Fred Hitchcock, the father of the girl, and Arthur Jones, to whom she was married, were arrested and arraigned. They pleaded not guilty to disorderly acts. A jury trial will be given the morrow.
