 Salvation Army Officer Making a Study of Conditions in Spartanburg County With That End in View.

 Spartanburg, S. C., May 12.—Col. Holland, of New York, who is at the head of the immigration department of the Salvation Army, in this country, is in the city making a study of the conditions in this county with the view of establishing a colony of immigrants on farms in this county. Recently the Salvation Army has given much attention to establishing colonies of immigrants on farming lands, though their work for the most part has been confined to the West, where a large number of colonies are now in a flourishing condition. Colonel Holland hopes to be able to do some work in the South, particularly in South Carolina, which State is paying more attention to immigration than all the others.  
 Colonel Holland will probably spend several days in the city and immediate section, securing data on agriculture. He is anxious to learn all the system of renting lands to tenants and share croppers, the price of labor, etc. He will visit a number of landowners and will also call on tenants and learn from them first hand of the conditions in this part of the South.
