New York, May 15.—In the men's wear divisions of the dry goods market, trade is slow because of the weather conditions adversely affecting the clothing trade. Silk ribbons continue active. Silk piece goods are slow for the moment. Cotton goods continue to show an advancing tendency in heavy and medium weight lines. Cotton yarns are firmer. Buying in cotton goods is proceeding actively for next spring. Underwear and hosiery lines for spring are now being opened in a small way. The larger lines will not be opened for two weeks.
