

Winston-Salem, May 17.—The telephone controversy remains unsettled. A number of the committee was held last night what was the status of affairs and if all the committees are like him an agreement is not near at hand. He did not know just how the matter stood and had not heard it mentioned in several days. The members of the joint committee from the board of aldermen have severed their connection in the matter since a new board took charge the first of the week. Whether a new committee will be appointed and the matter taken up again is a mooted question just now.

Will Gray and John Cummings, two white men employed at the lumber plant of Alderman E. E. Palm, were seriously injured Wednesday afternoon by having a pile of lumber to overturn and strike them. Both men were unconscious for a while after the accident, but were comfortable this evening.

Dr. J. H. Hrie, of Pittsboro, whose home was destroyed by fire last evening and reported in the newspapers, was in the city last night. The newspaper reports were the first intimation that he had of the fire. He left at once for home. The fire originated, it is said, in an outhouse, where there had been no fire for months. The residence was built 61 years ago by Col. H. A. London and with the furniture, was insured for about \$2,500.

**AN OFFICER WITH BACKBONE.**  
United States Marshal George Pritchard Proves That He is of the Pure "Tar Heel" Strain by Refusing to be Frightened by a Mob.

Asheville, May 17.—A story received here from the far West having to do with United States Marshal George Pritchard, of Indian Territory, who was formerly sheriff of Mitchell county and recognized as one of the most nerve men, physically, that ever went out of the State, will be of interest in this city and section. Mr. Pritchard since going to Indian Territory as United States marshal has done some effective work in putting an end to lawlessness and has won quite a reputation for himself. Last week a horrible crime was committed in the Territory, when a negro criminally assaulted a little girl of German parentage. The brute was promptly arrested by one of Mr. Pritchard's deputy marshals and while en route to jail an armed mob of 500 men took the negro and lynched him. Marshal Pritchard immediately got into communication with the department at Washington and, while excitement was at fever heat, went to the vicinity of the crime and placed under arrest, charging them with murder, seven of the most prominent and wealthy citizens of that section of the Territory. The men included a cotton broker, merchants, etc. While the United States marshal was making the arrest threats against his life were made with a degree of frequency that might have worried or frightened a man less gritty than George Pritchard. The former Mitchell county sheriff, however, never hesitated an instant. He escorted his seven prominent and influential prisoners to the railway station and subsequently landed them in jail at South McAllister, where they stand charged with complicity in the lynching of the negro and where they will be tried for their lives.

**TRAINMEN YET IN SESSION.**  
Convention to be Addressed To-Day by Samuel Gompers.  
Atlanta, Ga., May 17.—Proposed amendments to the constitution of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen were under consideration at the biennial convention here to-day and the work was incomplete at the afternoon adjournment. It is expected that the election of officers and the selection of the next place of meeting will be accomplished to-morrow, but final adjournment is not likely to be reached before next week. The delegates will be addressed to-morrow afternoon by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor.
