University Graduating Class on 07 Will Take a Departure From a Custom Set Relative to the Aunumi - Citte

May 28 .--- The class o 1907, which graduates at the University shortly, has made a departure from the custom set by the classe preceding it in regard to the class gift, presented yearsy to the University by the graduating class. Its gift will be an endbwment fund, the sum accumulated at the end of ten years to be used in beautifying the grounds of the University. For many years it was customary for the gift to consist of a piece of statuary, set of valuable books or somethin

similar. However, the class of 1905 decided that a more practical gift would be in the shape of an endow-ment fund to be raised by the class through a period of ten years and applied at the end of that time to some definite need of the college. The class of 1906 followed this plan

But the class of 1907, while following this general plan, has already de-cided that the sum accumulated shall be expended in beautifying the campus and grounds of the University. Naturally the University has one of the most beautiful campus sites to be found anywhere, but little or no ystematic care is taken of it and the neglect is beginning to tell. The class of 1907 wishes to remedy this as far as is in its power.

As planned a series of ten notes are signed by each member of the class, the last note to fall due in 1917 and the minimum amount of each note being \$1.50. As the class ers sixty men this will give a total in ten years of \$900 at the mini-mum, exclusive of interest up to 1917. The sum will undoubtedly be much arger, however, as many of the men
