



He says that the gift of Cecil Rhodes, the greatest benefaction which the university has received of late years, has brought with it a burden, adding, as it does, 200 men from all parts of the British empire, from the United States and from Germany to the body of undergraduates, and im-posing upon the university the necessi-ty of offering the newcomers all that
