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PETER PAN WINS HIGH STAKES.
 Defeats His Half-Brother Superman,
 by Three Lengths at Belmont Park
 —The Day's Summary.

New York, May 30.—Peter Pan, a sturdy son of Commando, defeated his half-brother Superman, by three lengths for the rich Belmont stakes at Belmont Park to-day. Both horses ran in 10 colors of James R. Keene and their success brought to the stable \$25,000, and the handsome plate that each year is given the winner. Frank Gill, the big ungainly chestnut colt from the string of "Lucky Jack" McGinnis, was third. It is estimated that 40,000 persons saw the race. The Keene stable was the favorite in the betting.

The race over the mile and three furlongs was a heart-breaking one from start to finish. The time taken 2:15 3/5 which the timer admitted is wrong, he having snapped his watch when Peter Pan was yet about 170 feet from the finish, shows, however, that the race was run in about 2:18, which still would clip two seconds off the best time for the course, made by Burgomaster last year.

NEW CIRCULAR TRACK RECORD.
 Automobile Driven by Wallace C. Hood, of Baltimore, Covers Distance of 100 Miles in 2 Hours 12 Minutes 45 Seconds.

Washington, May 30.—The world's automobile racing record for 100 miles on a circular track was broken to-day when Wallace C. Hood, of Baltimore, won over seven contestants in the country run at Fenning's, D. C., at the first national automobile meet given under the auspices of the United States Motor Racing Association. Hood's time was 2 hours 12 minutes 45 seconds. He drove a 60-horse power machine.

The previous record was made by Roger, of Racine, Wis., who scored 2 hours 18 minutes in a contest in Chicago about a year ago.

Atlantians Defend Their Titles.
 New Orleans, La., May 30.—At the Gulf States championship tennis tournament to-day, Thornton and Grant, of Atlanta, champions in the doubles, defended their title in a challenge match against Logan and Phelps, of New Orleans. Rain prevented the completion of the match after three sets had been played. The New Orleans team won the first two and Atlanta the last.

Edmond Phelps by defeating Merrill Smith, of New Orleans, for the singles championship this morning earned the right to meet Thornton, the present title holder in the singles, and their match will be played to-morrow afternoon.
