"ANGLO" CAUGHT A TARTAR.

Sneering London Writer Hears Something of Americans Abroad.

London Dispatch in New York Times.

Americans in London read to-day with delight Miss Jeannette L. Gilder's reply to some slurring and offensive remarks about Americans published a few days ago in a London paper over the signature "Anglo-American."

Every now and then some insignificant Britisher manages to make a pound or two selling an article in which he writes down Americans as coarse, uncouth, ill-dressed, harsh voiced and otherwise vulgar and objectionable.

In answer to the assertion that Americans are ruining the hotels of Europe, she says that in her opinion English hostilities have been much improved by American patronage. It is possible now to get something better to eat in them than joints, potatoes and squares of boiled cabbage, because Americans have insisted on good food. They have insisted on baths, too—real baths—and to satisfy the Americans' demand real baths have been put into hotels where formerly people had to do their bathing in little tin pans.

In the course of his article "Anglo-American" said the time might come when the best hotels in Europe would make a point of barring out Americans. Miss Gilder's reply is that the best hotels in London would have to close their doors and go out of business if they had no American patronage.
