

THE GRAND JURY CONDEMNED.

County Commissioners Go After the Body of Inquisition Conderning the Mr. Sicothsmy, Traveling in the In-terest of Missions, Discourses in an Convict Camp Matter With Gloves Interesting Way of the Customs of His Native Land—Personal Notes.

Winston-Salem, June 7 .- The couny commissioners in session yesterday passed a resolution severely condemning the recent Superior Court grand jury for that part of its report which referred to the sleep-ing apartments for the white and colored at the convict camp. The resolution was offered by Chairman

The resolution is to the effect that the grand jury's report was received, read and ordered to be filed; that as "recommendations made by the jury in reference to the court house we think, by the employment of an additional janitor during court, that the evils complained of can be remedied, but we do not consider there is danger of fire from old records or papers in the basement, as the floors are fire-proof.

"We condemn the grand jury for its senseless and misleading report in reference to the sleeping apartments at the county convict camp, in that they failed to state that whites sleep in one end and the negroes in the other end of the building."
