 Durham, June 12.—The Durham Light and Power Company which has been in the hands of the sheriff for some time, has settled up its affairs, the concern has changed hands and it is now on firm footing again. It was announced a week or more ago that the concern had been purchased by a New York syndicate. That was true but the papers were not all completed until now and to-day the company is not from the hands of the sheriff and all obligations are being met and accounts are being paid. Pending the confirmation of the sale the sheriff had executed against the old company, held on to the property until these claims were satisfied. The new syndicate has ample capital to conduct the affairs of the company on a business basis.
